Around the Jobie-verse

This edition we're excited to highlight Bethel #33 Kabacan, North Cotabato, Philippines' fundraising efforts with something that's sure to get your heart rate up - a badminton tournament!

Bethel #33 decided to hold an event to draw attention of their community, who are active sports enthusiasts in the Province of North Cotabato. They selected badminton because there are various clubs nearby that are involved in competitive competitions. This sporting event was a great way to get out the word about what our organization does to foster leadership, altruism, and character development while people engage in a fun physical activity for a good cause.

The goal of this badminton tournament is to raise enough money to assist the children's health care at the charitable day care center that has been selected, namely at Barangay Magatos, one of the Barangays (administrative neighborhood areas) in the Municipality of Kabacan. Understanding the importance of clean environments to halt the spread of infections and sustain health, the Bethel intends to use the activity's revenues to provide hygiene kits to kids. If possible, they'll also provide the children with school supplies and a food program.

This event generated ₱ 26,156.00 (Philippine pesos) overall income.

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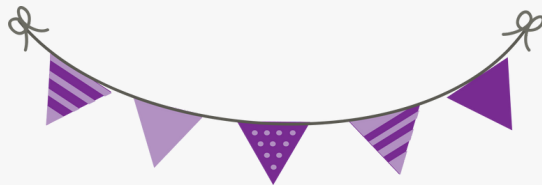
7641 Island and 111 Dialects

Who is a Jobie-to-Bee?

She is a young girl (between 7-9) who would like to make new friends and participate in new experiences while learning the basics of Job's Daughters. She can build self-confidence, be of service to others, enjoy fun activities, travel, and participate in local, state, and international Functions.



What do Bees do?



A Jobie-To-Bee will get to know the other Bees in their Bethel Beehive who are looking forward to joining Job's Daughters. A Beehive will often hold their activities in conjunction with the Bethel and under the supervision of a Bethel Beekeeper (a super awesome and fun lady).
